## The Smell of Christmas

I think this is one of those years my mother talked about. It feels like I just did Christmas. It has come back around too fast for me this year. So I got out my saucepan.

I knew I needed a Christmas jolt so I headed for my kitchen.

First thing I did was put two cups of water in the pan and 3 cinnamon sticks. Then I rooted around my cupboard for other things that evoke Christmas. I'm calling it "Holiday Aromatherapy."

Heat the water with the cinnamon sticks and then toss in a few other things that remind you of the holidays. Things that smell, to you, like a fresh Christmas and come from your cupboard.

## Options include:

- A tsp of dried orange or lemon peel
- Or use fresh peels
- $-\frac{1}{2}$  tsp of ground cloves or a tsp of nutmeg
- Maybe a bay leaf
- Or a couple of pieces of star anise

Toss in whatever brings the smell of Christmas into your nose. Don't overdo it. Just three or 4 of these elements will do it. Heat to a boil and then let it bubble for a while. Turn off and the smell of Christmas will fill your kitchen and beyond.
